Scholars holding a senior position at universities and other research institutions within above mentioned academic fields are entitled to nominate candidates for the Holberg International Memorial Prize.


The winner of the Holberg International Memorial Prize 2013 will be announced in February 2014. The official award ceremony will take place in Bergen, Norway in June 2014.

CALL FOR MOMINIATION THE HOLBERG INITERNATIONIAL MEMORIAL PRIZE 2014

THE LUDVIG HOLBERG MEMORIAL FUND INVITES NOMINATIONS FOR THE HOLBERG INTERNATIONAL MEMORIAL PRIZE FOR OUTSTANDING SCHOLARLY WORK IN THE ACADEMIC FIELDS OF THE ARTS AND HUMANITIES, SOCIAL SCIENCE, LAW AND THEOLOGY.

The Holberg Prize was established by the Norwegian Parliament in 2003 and is awarded annually by the Ludvig Holberg Memorial Fund. The Prize for 2014 amounts to 4,5 million NOK (approximately 610,000 EUR / 790,000 USD*). The prize winner for 2014 will be announced in February 2014, and the award ceremony will take place in Bergen, Norway in June 2014.

The Prize is awarded to scholars who have made outstanding contributions to research in the arts and humanities, social science, law or theology, either within these fields or through interdisciplinary work. The prize winner must have had a decisive influence on international research.

The Board of the Ludvig Holberg Memorial Fund awards the Prize at the recommendation of the Holberg Prize Academic Committee. The function of the nomination is to make the Committee aware of the candidate's work.

Scholars holding positions at universities and other research institutions, including academies, are entitled to nominate candidates to the Prize. The letter of nomination should be written in English and state the reason for the nomination in 2 to 3 pages. The nomination should also include the candidate's CV and suggest referees who know the scholar's work. The Committee particularly encourages nomination of established scholars below the age of seventy. Joint nominations do not strengthen a candidacy.

Nominations are strictly confidential. They should not be disclosed to the nominee or to others at any time.

The Holberg Prize is named after the Norwegian/Danish scholar and playwright Ludvig Holberg, who was born in Bergen in 1684. He held the Chairs of Metaphysics and Logic, Latin Rhetoric and History at the University of Copenhagen. Holberg had a modernizing influence on these subjects and he also helped to lay the foundation for the study of modern international law in Denmark/Norway. His work has been widely published and has also had broad appeal outside academia.
