- 3. Ibsen's Use of Drama as a Forum for Social Issues in his A Doll's House Illustrate.
- 4. Describe how Faustus surrendered his soul to the devil.

- 5. How Anton Chekhov's The Cherry Orchard fuses both a high level of psychological realism with a detailed Symbolism?
- 6. How is Pygmalion a problem play?
- 7. Explain how the play Murder in the Cathedral expresses and explores the conflict between "action" and "suffering."
- 8. What do you think is the most effective way that Samuel Beckett presents the repetition in Waiting for Godot?

- 9. What is your opinion of the condition of Lear's mind in the opening scene? What effect does his increasing passion seem to have upon his faculties? Discuss the character of the king.

- Compare Torvald's and Nora's attitudes toward money in A Doll's House.
- 12. Discuss 'Doctor Faustus' as amorality play.
- 13. Write an essay on the theme of the play Pygmalion.

- 14. In what ways is the play Murder in the Cathedrel pessimistic? In what ways is it optimistic?
- 15. Explain in detail the theme of 'uncertainty" in Samuel Beckett's Waiting for Godot.
- 16. Write a note on the themes of anger and frustration in Osborne's Look Back in Anger.
